WHAT IS DIFFERENT?

Appointments are virtual whenever possible. Interviews, psychological exams, social worker calls, and other screening appointments are completed over Zoom, email, and phone.

Intended parents care deeply about the health and safety of their surrogate and baby. Nearly all families request to be matched with a vaccinated surrogate.

Fertility clinics require the vaccine for surrogates.



WHAT HASN'T CHANGED?

[FDA Approval of COVID-19 Vaccine](#)

“On August 23, 2021, the FDA approved the first COVID-19 vaccine. The vaccine has been known as the Pfizer-BioNTech COVID-19 Vaccine, and will now be marketed as Comirnaty, for the prevention of COVID-19 disease in individuals 16 years of age and older.”

“COVID-19 vaccination is recommended for all people 12 years and older, including people who are pregnant, breastfeeding, trying to get pregnant now, or might become pregnant in the future.”

[ACOG and SMFM Recommendation](#)

“The American College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists (ACOG) and the Society for Maternal-Fetal Medicine (SMFM), the two leading organizations representing specialists in obstetric care, recommend that all pregnant individuals be vaccinated against COVID-19. The organizations’ recommendations in support of vaccination during pregnancy reflect evidence demonstrating the safe use of the COVID-19 vaccines during pregnancy from tens of thousands of reporting individuals over the last several months, as well as the current low vaccination rates and concerning increase in cases.”
